from Student Rabbi Cohen...

Sh'ma! Listen! Take a moment to stop what you are doing and listen. Take a moment to truly hear every noise. This includes not only the sounds surrounding you but also the sound of your voice within. Our senses play an important role in Judaism. Our services and festivals are filled with sound, sight, smell, taste and touch, all allowing us to fully connect.

We begin the year with the blasts of the shofar, allowing it to stir our souls, to awaken our best selves and to prompt us to act upon Judaism's ways. We continue to Sukkot where we take time to shake the *lulav*, listening to the rustle of the branches and smelling the *etrog*. During Simchat Torah, we hold the Torah, drawing it close as we physically connect to our chain of tradition. Channukah brings light to the eyes, illuminating the gloom of winter. Tu b'Shevat reminds us of how grateful we should be for each bite we are blessed to take. Now, what about Purim? Purim is a holiday of NOISE! Think of the loud, maybe obnoxious sound of the grogger.

"Grogger" is the Yiddish word for noisemaker. We swing our groggers to drown out the name of Haman when our Purim *megillah* (story) is read out loud. We attempt to drown out the villain of the holiday. The noise of the grogger is a symbol of tension and conflict. However, on Purim, there is one noise more important than the grogger, even more important than the chanting of the *megillah*—it is laughter!

During the Hebrew month when Purim occurs, the Talmud tells us, "When the month of Adar enters, we increase in joy (*Taanit 29a*). Still, there are many times in our life when we wish we could make our fears, trials and tribulations go away. We wish we could block them out of our lives. Although in reality the solution isn't as simple as a grogger, Purim reminds us that sounds of tension are soon replaced with shouts of joy and laughter. So, this Purim, find time to add some laughter into your life. Purim is not just for kids. Laughter is not just for kids. Find some time to listen to the clear, still voice within, and remember that whatever test may come your way, the noise of joy and victory will be right around the corner. As with silent prayer, take some time to listen; you may just hear God's guiding voice in return.

This is a quick, enjoyable, and inspirational read.

from the Congregation President...

What is a mitzvah? (Plural is mitzvot.) Very often, a mitzvah is translated as “a good deed”. While that is true, it is incomplete when one looks at the root of the word mitzvah.

The root is “tsav”, which translates as command. So, a mitzvah is a good deed AND in its strictest sense, refers to those commanded to us in the Torah. (We know that the word is also often used in a more generic sense to include laws, practices and customs that indicate any good deed.)

We commonly accept that there is a list of 613 mitzvot although there are some disagreements on the precise list. The disagreements are due to some slight discrepancies in the way some lists interpret related or overlapping mitzvot. The most accepted list is that of Maimonides who, in his introduction to his book Mishneh Torah, lists all of the positive mitzvot and all of the negative mitzvot, and then divides them into subject matter categories. Of the 613 commandments, there are 248 positive commandments (do) and 365 negative commandments (do not do).

Maimonides begins the list of 613 with these:

- 1) To know that there is a god. Exodus 20:2: God spoke all these words, saying: I am the Lord your God who took you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage
- 2) Not to entertain thoughts of other gods besides Him. Exodus 20:3: You shall not have the gods of others in My Presence.
- 3) To know that He is one. Deuteronomy 6:4 Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God; the Lord is one.

In our modern world, we often feel societal pressure to reject notions of God and/or God’s commandments. While we all likely have questions about our faith and about God, and perhaps disagree with many of the 613 mitzvot, I believe that as Jews, we have an obligation to try to understand and act according to the laws and precepts—the mitzvot—of our Torah.

Reforest Israel by planting trees in Israel through JNF, the Jewish National Fund. The price of one tree is \$18.

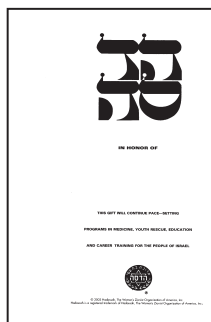



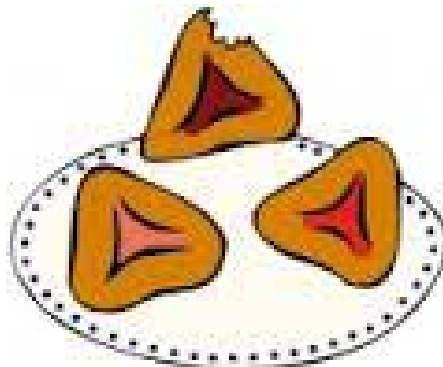
